

MAKE YOUR VOTE COUNT! SPECIAL MEETING 2018

14 March | It's time to have your say!

Zespri is holding a Special Meeting of Shareholders on Wednesday 14 March, commencing at 1pm. The Special Meeting is a uniquely important moment for our industry, providing an opportunity to strengthen grower ownership and control of Zespri through improving the alignment between production and Zespri shareholding.

The recommendations to be voted on at the meeting have been developed as an outcome of the Kiwifruit Industry Strategy Project, with proposals to improve alignment receiving overwhelming support in the 2015 grower referendum. The need is significant. A growing number of New Zealand kiwifruit growers do not own Zespri shares – today, over 18 million shares are held by people who have left the industry.

The recommendations include two key aspects:

IMPLEMENTING THE KIWIFRUIT INDUSTRY STRATEGY PROJECT

- A share cap to improve alignment between production and shareholding, with a maximum shareholding of four shares for each tray of production. A requirement to sell would only apply to currently over-shared producers after a transition period. Similarly a voting cap would be introduced with one voting share for each tray of production.
- Dividend restrictions on shareholders who are no longer producing shareholders. This would also only apply after a transition period.

Zespri Chairman Peter McBride notes, "The recommended changes are vital for the longevity of our industry structure, which underlines the delivery of sustainable value to growers over the long-term. The Board of Directors therefore recommends the full set of changes be approved by shareholders."

A new resolution has recently been added to the voting agenda for the Special Meeting, 14 March.

Subject to the current voting cap under the constitution, Resolution 7 seeks approval for a proposal by Zespri to conduct a targeted share-issue, buy-back and distribution where the overall value of the transaction exceeds the major transaction threshold set out in the Companies Act 1993.

Under the Companies Act 1993, transactions which exceed a certain financial size require the approval of shareholders of a company by way of a special resolution as 'major transactions.' The share issue, buy-back and any subsequent distributions to shareholders, when taken together, may exceed the financial threshold set out in the Act. While the Board has yet to determine the full scope of the transaction, Zespri is seeking shareholder approval in the event where we do fall over the threshold.

The targeted share-issue and buy-back process was instigated to promote better grower/shareholder alignment at a level closer to one share per tray. Read more about Resolution 7 at **www.kisp.co.nz.** Up until very recently, Zespri has operated on a trust system in relation to shareholding by lessees.

However, given the proposed changes to its constitution, including the changes to shareholding entitlements, Zespri needs to be sure that its records are accurate.

We also need to be sure that lessees who want to purchase shares, are in fact producers, i.e. have a lease of one year or more of land in New Zealand for the supply of kiwifruit to Zespri.

Zespri has sent out letters with declaration forms requesting copies of leases and for the declaration to be completed in accordance with the instructions provided.

We urgently need lessees that haven't yet done so, to send the information back to us.

What are the consequences of not providing evidence that I have a valid lease of a KPIN?

If you are a lessee shareholder and Zespri does not have the required evidence of a valid lease, and all the constitutional amendments are adopted in March next year, you will be:

- Recorded as a dry shareholder;
- Lose dividends on your shares after the specified time period;
- Lose the right to vote your shares at the annual meeting; and
- You will not be permitted to buy any more Zespri shares.

THE VOTING PROCESS AT A GLANCE

There are seven resolutions to be voted on at the Special Meeting. However, not all shareholders will need to vote on the same resolutions.

- Producers will be voting on resolutions 1, 2, 3, 5 and 7
- Non-producers will be voting on resolutions 2, 4 and 6



The voting options below show how you as an individual producer might vote, based on which particular outcome you wish to support. For example, if you wish to support the full package of recommended changes to the Constitution which are consistent with the proposals voted for in the KISP referendum, (as permitted under the Regulations) including the share cap, voting entitlement and dividend cap, you would vote in favour of resolutions one, two, three and five. There are basically three options.



Due to the constitution's voting cap, the Kiwifruit Export Regulations and the Companies Act, the voting process will vary according to the voter category type and entitlements.

The voting process is relatively complex, so we've included a simplified infographic to help to guide you in having your say at the Special Meeting.



The voting options below show how you as an individual non-producer might vote, based on which particular outcome you wish to support. For example, if you wish to support the full package of recommended changes to the Constitution, including the share cap, voting entitlement and dividend cap for both current and future non-producers, you would vote for resolutions two, four and six. If you support the share cap and voting entitlement for producers but not either of the proposed dividend restrictions then you would vote for resolution two but against resolutions four and six. There are basically four options.



Please note: in addition to the six resolutions that relate to the proposed constitution changes, shareholders will be asked to consider Resolution 7. This is a vote of all shareholders under the current voting cap to approve share issue, buy-back and distribution as a major transaction. See **www.kisp.co.nz** for further information.

New executive structure for Zespri

Zespri has announced an executive-level restructure to better align the business for the strong growth ahead.

Zespri Chief Executive Dan Mathieson says the strengthened executive will set the company up to achieve its challenging mission of more than doubling global sales to NZ\$4.5 billion by 2025.

"It is clear to all that our mission is a bold one; one we will only achieve with strong, decisive and active leadership and clear priorities.

"Our Executive Team combines expertise and experience, leveraging the fresh perspective that we have acquired in the last few years with the deep industry insight that has made us so successful to date. It's about bringing everyone together to create One Zespri with One Industry mission.

- Including in the Executive Team the portfolios of Supply Chain, Grower & Alliances and International Production, with the role of Chief Operating Officer not being replaced.
- Separating the Sales and Marketing portfolios to create Chief Marketing Officer and Chief Market Performance Officer

positions. This will ensure that Zespri has the focus to not only continue to deepen our win-win relationships with key customers around the world, but also the focus to strengthen our ability to understand consumers' needs and engage them with better experiences.

- Creating a new Executive portfolio for Digital Technology to help Zespri embrace the possibilities of technology, integrate our increasingly global organisation and improve our core business.
- Creating a new Executive portfolio for Innovation and Sustainability.

Enduring funding mechanism

Following the endorsement of an enduring funding mechanism by the Industry Advisory Council (IAC) on 2 November, we confirm formal approval of the agreement is now complete.

In December, the Enduring Funding Agreement was ratified by Registered Suppliers, Zespri and New Zealand Kiwifruit Growers Incorporated (NZKGI). Confirmation of the new funding mechanism also activated the IAC approval of amendments to the loyalty contract, as well as the adoption of the Zespri Segment Allocation Manual. The enduring funding mechanism is a key milestone towards the outcomes of the Kiwifruit Industry Strategy Project (KISP).

Based on principles outlined in KISP, the mechanism aims to ensure Zespri is funded appropriately, balanced against the need for appropriate cost control, to ensure that the benefits of economies of scale are shared between growers and shareholders. It replaces the former industry convention of renegotiating funding/margin arrangements every three years, and instead delivers an automatic margin resetting mechanism targeting a New Zealand supply EBIT of approximately one percent.

Implementation will mean Zespri's New Zealand supply margin in 2018/19 will be approximately \$3.5 million to \$4.0 million lower compared to the previous calculation - equivalent to around 2.5 cents per tray on average. The mechanism also includes a further reduction in Zespri's gross margin on New Zealand kiwifruit sales in 2019/20, so the margin decreases by approximately \$7.0m to \$8.0m, or 5.0 cents a tray on average, compared to the current calculation. From 2020 an automatic margin resetting mechanism has been agreed that targets a New Zealand supply EBIT of approximately one percent.

Loyalty payments

Any earnings before interest and tax from NZ supply over one percent of net NZ kiwifruit sales (if applicable) will now be equally shared with growers in the form of increased loyalty payments. Loyalty payments for the 2017/18 season are currently at 25 cents per tray, and any applicable additions to loyalty payments will take effect from June 2018. The loyalty payment will continue to be paid in two instalments. The first instalment is paid in January of the year following harvest and the remainder is paid in June of the same year. The first instalment of the 2017 loyalty payment, being \$0.10 per Class 1 tray supplied FOBS, was paid 15 January.

What will growers need to do to take advantage of the new loyalty structure?

Growers will not need to take any action to take advantage of the new loyalty structure. As directed in December's Kiwiflier, Zespri will update the loyalty contract immediately to reflect the IAC approved changes, and all current loyalty contracts will automatically transfer to the new wording effective immediately. Any growers who required a new loyalty contract for the 2017 season will have already been contacted by Zespri to complete a new form.

Gold3 Licence Release: 2018 mechanism and process

The Licence Application Overview and Rules (LAOR) will be published and available to view on Canopy (canopy.zespri.com) on 7 March. Please note as per the timetable below, the application window will open on 28 March.

The release of this documentation follows the Board's decision in October to release 700 hectares of Gold3 licence and 50 hectares of Gold3 Organic licence in 2018.

2018 online licence application

There are two ways a grower can apply for licence this year. Growers can either complete the application form (downloaded from Canopy) manually, or you have the option to complete an online form via the Industry portal, which is also found on Canopy. If you choose to complete the application via the Zespri Industry Portal (available from 28 March till 5pm on 11 April), your KPIN and legal entity details will be available for you to select and will pre-populate on the form. A copy of your application will then be emailed to you for you to view and finalise your bidding details, ready to be posted to Cooney Lees Morgan prior to the close of the application window.

Both options still require the applicant to print and post a copy of their application form along with their deposit payment to Cooney Lees Morgan before 5pm on 11 April.

To complete an online application via the Industry Portal, log on to Canopy. Next, under the Industry Portal click on the Online Licence tab as below (note: only available from 28 March-11 April).

2018 process - Gold3 organic

- Minimum bid area: 1 hectare
- Maximum bid area: 10 hectares
- Must be new plantings (no Hayward conversion)
- No deferred payment terms to be offered 25 percent due upon application and the balance is due the 20 July 2018.
- A 'use it or lose it' grafting requirement expiring 31 January 2020 will apply to all licences issued in 2018.

The LAOR documents contains the rules and the application forms for each of the allocations. There will be a separate LAOR for the Gold3 Organic Process. There are strict rules regarding the Gold3 Organic Licence and significant consequences for not complying with the terms and conditions, so all growers considering making an application for the licence are encouraged to inform themselves, seek appropriate advice and read the LAOR before applying.

It's registration time again

The 2018 KPIN and grower registrations are now due. Growers are encouraged to complete these online through the Zespri Industry Portal. If you would like to receive this in the mail, please contact Grower Support Services. An icon in the top right-hand corner by your name on your portal home screen will indicate that you have a notification waiting.

Once you have clicked on the icon you will receive instructions on how to complete your registration. Please note that you are required to complete two separate registrations: one for your KPIN and a second one for the entity that owns the orchard.

What is the portal?

The portal is a window into Zespri - this displays all the information regarding your orchard that we hold.

Growers can access Zespri Industry Portal by using their Canopy username and password, no additional login is required. To access the portal, navigate to: Canopy > Zespri & The Kiwifruit Industry > Tools & Calculators > Zespri Industry Portal. Or you can add this to your Canopy Favourites





Financial Commentary

Progress payments

Progress payments have been calculated to ensure cash is returned to the grower as quickly as possible and fairly across all sizes. Payments have been set so that the percentage of total fruit and service payments across the sizes are equal where possible. The rates have been set without direct reference to the size ratios.

Sizes will not receive a progress payment where the percentage of total fruit and service payments paid to date are higher than the other sizes in the same pool.




Season grower payments portions - Total Fruit and Service Payments


Zespri Organic Field Day

New approved provider for maturity clearance services 2018 to 2020

Zespri has run a tendering process for the industry's maturity clearance services over the past four months.

The Zespri Board and Industry Advisory Council has approved a new provider, Verified Lab Services (VLS), to process around 20 percent of laboratory testing requirements for non-regionally-processed samples. The existing service provider Eurofins Bay of Plenty (Eurofins) has been retained for all other maturity clearance services including sampling. Eurofins will sub-contract sampling and laboratory testing services for the Hawke's Bay and Nelson regions. All reporting will continue to be provided through the eurofinsbop.co.nz website.

VLS is a subsidiary of Seeka Limited, a post-harvest supplier and is accredited by IANZ to ISO 17025 for all kiwifruit maturity clearance tests. All samples processed by VLS will be blinded so VLS is not aware of the

growers or maturity areas they are processing. This sample blinding will avoid any perceived conflict of interest that could arise from a laboratory testing service provider being affiliated with a post-harvest supplier.

The intention is for Zespri to negotiate three-year contracts with both Eurofins and VLS for all services except for reporting. In addition to the three-year term, an extension option will be available of up to two years at Zespri and the industry's discretion – this is intended to encourage price reduction and/or service improvement during the contract term. Once contracts are agreed with both Eurofins Bay of Plenty and VLS, a 2018 standard price list will be published.

The month ahead: February

Below is a small excerpt from 'The Month ahead for February,' the full version has much more information which we encourage you to read on the Canopy > growing kiwifruit > The month ahead > The month ahead: February.

As we approach harvest, there are lots of tasks to tick off and some key events to help support you in making the harvest decision.

Monitoring

It's getting to that time when fruit monitoring samples are kicking off and we're getting an indication of how fresh weight and dry matter accumulation compare to previous seasons. Monitoring is a critical part of making the harvest decision and these early samples will give a good indication of how much of the season's potential you've captured.

Pre-harvest orchard management

There are lots of tasks to tick off pre-harvest and getting them done soon will make orchard life a bit less stressful in the weeks to come. Check out the 'Harvest Checklist Need to Know' on the Canopy > Zespri & The Kiwifruit Industry > Publications > Need to Knows.

Crop protection

A dry summer usually means more sooty mould from passionvine hopper (PVH). Control this annoying pest with applications of pyrethrum - use PyGanic or ZETaPY to avoid market restrictions. Make sure you consult the Crop Protection Standard to check for any rule changes and if you're not subscribed to the pre-harvest news and updates email, register now by visiting Canopy > Zespri & The Kiwifruit Industry > Publications > KiwiTips.

Check for giant willow aphid (GWA) in shelter. Trimming shelters can reduce the population.

Second generation scale crawlers are on the move so monitor as now is the time to control these but note that Gold3 skin is sensitive to damage from oil applications up to 90 days after fruitset.

Trunk girdling on Bounty71

Bounty71 is promoted as a rootstock that increases fruit dry matter by about one percent compared to Bruno. It is possible that this increase in dry matter results from Bounty reducing the vigour of vines. If so, girdling vines grafted on Bounty may not result in the same dry matter gains as girdling Bruno.

Kris Kramer-Walter, Peter Blattmann and Bill Snelgar from Plant & Food Research ran a trial in 2017 to look at whether trunk girdling Gold3 on Bounty had the same effect on dry matter as trunk girdling Gold3 on Bruno. As the vines were still

young, only one summer trunk girdle was applied per vine. Girdles were applied on one of two dates, 26 January or 23 February.

The results showed that trunk girdling vines on Bounty worked. By 4 April, girdling had provided an additional one percent (January girdle) or 0.6 percent (February girdle) dry matter compared to non-girdled vines. Summer trunk girdling of Gold3 on Bounty71 rootstocks appears to be just as effective as girdling on Bruno rootstocks.

Copper use after flowering





Weather station data is collected and fed into the online Psa Risk Model.

While a Psa risk typically drops when temperatures rise above 20 degrees, it's important to keep watching the online Psa Risk Model as pockets of moderate and high-risk weather can still occur.

Psa leaf spots remain a potential inoculum source if weather favours Psa so it is important cover is applied following canopy work and male pruning rounds. Ensure protection is in place prior to high-risk weather.

When applying coppers, maintain a five to seven-day gap between applications of foliars and copper to minimise risk of phytotoxicity to leaves and fruit. Do not apply sprays in poor drying conditions, or high humidity, as risk of fruit staining increases

Also, choose low-risk weather periods when applying girdles. If copper sprays are used to cover girdling wounds, make sure correct rates are used. High rates of copper should not be applied directly to open girdles.



Stink bug treatment for sea containers from Italy





How to identify the Brown Marmorated Stink Bug, one of the kiwifruit industry's most unwanted pests.

After KVH and other horticultural industries lobbied the Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI), we are pleased changes have been made to import requirements for sea containers loaded and exported to New Zealand from Italy.

We have been discussing with MPI the need for stricter measures to help manage the risk of Brown Marmorated Stink Bug (BMSB) because of increased finds of the bug at the border, and uncertainty around the ability of importers to verify compliance with import requirements.

Sea containers now have the same requirements as vehicles and machinery from Italy for fumigation or heat treatment which must take place before shipping. Documentation must be provided to MPI verifying this.

In place until March, the extra requirement means we, as an industry, can be more confident systems are in place that appropriately manage the risk posed by BMSB at our border over the high-risk summer period. MPI have listened to the concerns raised and taken the right steps.

It's important that everyone understands the seriousness of a BMSB invasion, as it is not just a horticultural pest but a lifestyle pest as well. Not only can the bugs ruin crops and gardens, they can also infest buildings and houses. They like to hide in dark spaces, cracks and crevices. Keep an eye out for them and if you think you've found anything unusual catch it, snap it, and report it to MPI on 0800 80 99 66.

There are also short videos on the KVH website from the USA, where the ever-expanding BMSB population is taking over lifestyles. Share the video with your friends and family as everyone could be affected by this pest if it establishes in New Zealand.





Zespri finalist for Massey University Domestic Partnership Excellence Award

Liquidation of the KVH Foundation



A proposed resolution to liquidate the KVH Foundation Incorporated was confirmed and passed at the pre-Christmas Special General Meeting on Tuesday 12 December.

The liquidation completes the process of Kiwifruit Vine Health Incorporated and the KVH Foundation Incorporated moving to a single entity - Kiwifruit Vine Health Incorporated - that represents the kiwifruit industry under the Government Industry Agreement (GIA). Liquidators will formally dissolve the Foundation and complete all necessary legal requirements.

Zespri awards academic excellence in Biological Sciences

Zespri has sponsored an award for Biological Sciences with the University of Auckland to encourage postgraduate interest into biosecurity research. The award recognises excellence demonstrated by Year 4 students in the field of Biological Sciences.

Last year student, Shara Van de Pas, took out the competition for the inaugural award. Shara was presented with the Zespri prize by University of Auckland School of Biological Sciences, Head of Department, Eileen McLaughlin.



Zespri is delighted to have been selected as a finalist for the Massey University annual award for partnership excellence.

Chosen as one of five finalist organisations, the award recognises active collaboration with the University across a range of areas including: research, knowledge exchange, teaching and learning, reaching new audiences and internationalisation.

Massey University highlighted Zespri's contribution to research and development, particularly in post-harvest and human health. Closely involved in supporting tertiary research into horticulture, Zespri funds postgraduate scholarships and postdoctoral fellows, as well as contributing industrial research and learning support to Massey students and research staff. According to Massey the partnership has resulted in positive impacts on academic research, industry innovation and consumer health.

Zespri's tough competition for the award includes: Health Workforce New Zealand, Palmerston North City Council, Te Runanga Nui o Nga Kura Kaupapa Māori o Aotearoa and Venture Taranaki. The Domestic Partnership Excellence Award will be presented on 21 March at Parliament House, Wellington.

- **Q1:** Will Zespri hold industry field days for growers to look at the pre-commercial varieties?
- A1: Yes, field days will be held mid-February. An invitation will be extended through your post-harvest facility. Check with your packhouse for times and dates.

Q2: How do I become an organic grower and how long will it take?

A2: Conversion to full organic production takes three years. Typically this period starts from the time of the last conventional input on the orchard however can vary slightly between different countries' standards. Therefore it is best to register with BioGro early (i.e. close to the time of last conventional input). The first year is considered as the registration year for the orchard with the first audit taking place the following year. After the first audit, the orchard is considered to be in conversion year one. After the second audit, the orchard is in conversion year two. After successful completion of the third audit the orchard obtains full organic status, until this time, the fruit is sold as conventional kiwifruit. Whilst the orchard is in conversion, it is treated as an organic orchard in regards to spray diary audits, residue testing etc.

Upon registration with BioGro, you will need to fill out an online organic management plan. This includes, property and operation details, previous management, forward management plan, and affidavit for last prohibited input use. This organic management plan will form the basis of the annual audit and needs to be updated and submitted annually. As part of the annual renewal process with BioGro all proposed inputs are required to be submitted for approval. No inputs are allowed to be used without BioGro approval and no foliar products are allowed to be used without approval from both BioGro and Zespri.

Organic kiwifruit can be grown on the same orchard as conventional kiwifruit as long as there are appropriate barriers to mitigate the risk of cross-contamination (i.e. separate blocks segregated by shelter). If the kiwifruit are of the same variety, then this is considered parallel production and additional controls are needed to ensure the integrity of the organic product is maintained at all times.

Q3: Are there any average on-orchard costs available?

A3: Each year Zespri undertakes a survey to gauge on-orchard costs in the Industry which is useful as a benchmark for new and existing growers, and government agencies. We are asking for growers to help by providing their on-orchard costs (excluding debt servicing) to give us an accurate picture of current costings. If you can help, please contact your Grower Liaison Manager.

Q4: I have recently put up a shelter over my orchard blocks. Am I eligible for a hail insurance rebate?

- A4: Orchards with blocks with solid cover or hail netting will be eligible for a rebate. The rebate will be based on 80 percent of the total cost of the hail scheme for the season for the covered blocks production.
 - To be eligible for this rebate, growers with covered canopies must:
 - Have covered canopy erect by 01 November 2017.
 - Have a minimum of 0.20 hectares covered or an entire variety on orchard covered.
 - Have volume submitted into Zespri inventory that is from the area covered with hail netting or solid cover.
 - Have indicated on their Spray Diary for the season, before 28 February, which blocks have hail netting or solid cover.

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Q5: Can I get a Justified Approval to spray my shelters with Calypso for Passion Vine Hopper?

A5: Justified Approvals for insecticide applications to the shelterbelts/outside areas of your orchard will no longer be approved this season. Although the fruit isn't being sprayed directly, orchards are now at a stage where a residue risk is extremely high and growers should be extremely vigilant to prevent any chemical contamination of fruit.
